Introduction

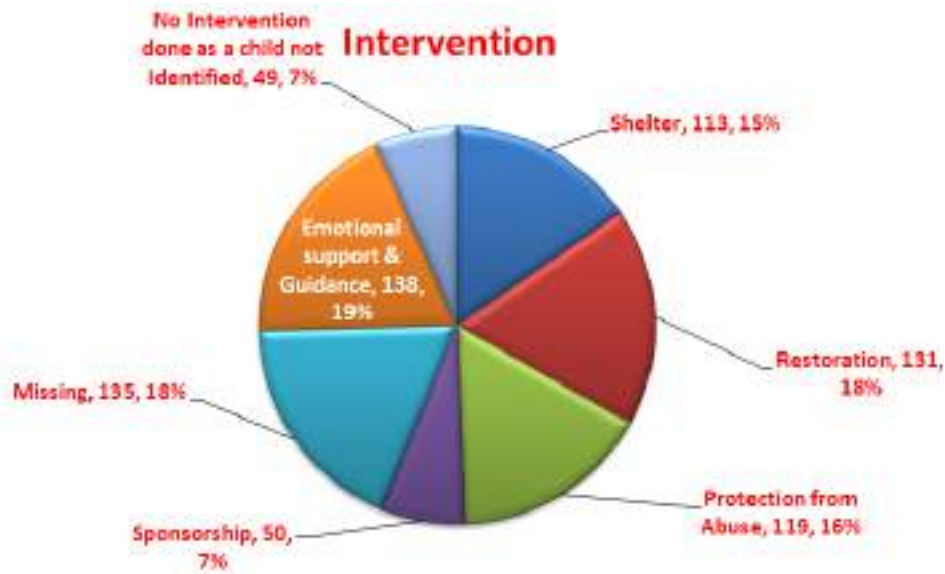
All children are considered to be at risk for exploitation, abuse violence and neglect. But vulnerability cannot be defined simply by age. Though age is one component, Vulnerability is also measured by the child's capability for self-protection. The questions that arise are whether children are capable of protecting themselves; can children provide for their basic needs, defend against a dangerous situation or even recognise a dangerous situation is developing? These questions call for a redefinition of the concept of self-protection. A child's vulnerability comes from various factors that hinder a child's ability to function and grow normally. Hence self-protection is more about the ability of the child to lead a healthy life within a child protection system; the ability to protect themselves or get help from people who can provide protection.

Vulnerability of children leads to and is further created by the socio-cultural, socio-political and socio-religious situations they are in. A child who is forced or born into a situation or discriminated group is at risk for abuse, neglect and exploitation. The lack of a protection system either due to mis-implementation of national laws and programmes or the absence of protection policies and legislation also renders children vulnerable. Rescuing children in crisis is important but not the only focus of CHILDLINE 1098. Initiating mass awareness campaigns on child sexual abuse and related issues on child rights violations, enlisting children's participation as volunteers and facilitating open house discussions in the community are also important.

The CHILDLINE Contact Centre (CCC) is the centralized call centre initiative of CIF all over Tamilnadu (excepting Chennai). CIF has selected SOC SEAD as Collab for the interim time period. This set up is to ensure better connectivity from all operators to 1098. It receives calls to 1098 from all districts in Tamilnadu. Intervention calls are forwarded to partners.

1. Intervention Calls to 1098

Intervention involves reaching out to children in crisis providing emergency assistance and linking them to services available for long-term care. **CHILDLINE** received total of 97,710 calls during the period April 2013 – March 2014, out of which 735 were recorded as intervention calls.



2. Number of Weekly Meetings Held with Team Members:

Review Meetings:

During the project period, 42 review meets have been conducted in order to appraise the work performance of the staff, to discuss the problems faced by them in the field and to take remedial measures to overcome the problem for the smooth functioning of the project. Every Saturday, the meeting was conducted along with the City, Centre coordinator, Team members and volunteers. The Director's meeting (Nodal & Collab) along with the coordinators (Nodal & Collab) was held periodically to discuss the issues and plan new activities.

3. Number of Awareness Programmes Conducted:

Outreach Awareness:

Regular outreach awareness has been conducted in railway stations with the support of railway police. This year **34** awareness programmes have been organised and **14,107** benefitted.

Police Personnel Awareness:

Police Personnel plays an important role in safeguarding the rights and interest of the public. As they have direct contact with the people, it becomes essential to make them aware of the services rendered by CHILDLINE. Keeping this in mind, Railway Protection Force, Railway police, City police personnel, Home Guard, were given **59** awareness

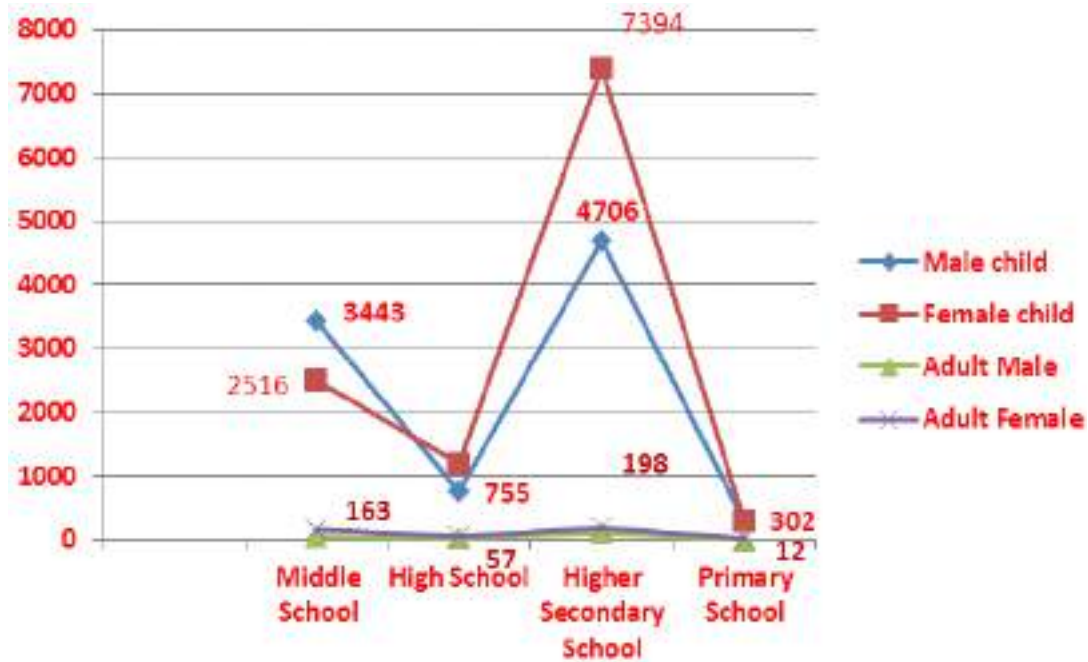
programmes about the role of CHILDLINE and around **786 (536 M,250F)** police personnel including Trainees benefited through these programmes.

Auto Drivers Awareness:

Auto drivers have more public contacts and so it becomes necessary to make them aware of the role of CHILDLINE and the free emergency services provided by 1098 so that they can help the children in distress. This year **39** awareness programmes have been organised accordingly and around **724 (723M, 1F)** auto drivers were given awareness about the importance and services of CHILDLINE.

School Awareness:

Around **21,322** school children from 48 schools in various slum areas were benefited. Through the school awareness the children came to know about their own rights and if denied, the ways and means to approach CHILDLINE to safeguard their rights.



Festival Awareness:

During festival season, CHILDLINE created awareness in temples, churches, mosques and in shopping centres where mass people pass by, about the services rendered by 1098 to protect the interest of children and around 2185 people including children were benefited through these awareness programmes.



P C O Awareness:

PCOs are the main source of transmitting information about the children in distress and so, it becomes necessary to make the PCO owners to be aware of the services rendered by 1098. This year 39 awareness programmes were organised accordingly and around 687 (477M, 210F) people were given awareness by CHILDLINE.

Self Help Group:

The awareness programme on CHILDLINE 1098 was conducted by 25 Women Self help Groups through songs, skit and cultural programmes by the team members. The programme was useful as about 2500 women benefitted and came to know about CHILDLINE 1098

Exhibition Awareness:

This year Tamilnadu Government organized an Exhibition about the services of Govt. department and Govt. schemes for the public at St. John Vestry Anglo Indian Hr. Sec. School Ground, Trichy. It is noteworthy to mention that for Second time, CHILDLINE got a chance to exhibit the activities and to provide awareness for the huge mass, continuously for 33 days from 11.05.2013 to 26.06.2013 at John Vestry Anglo Indian Hr. Sec. School, Trichy.



VBS Awareness:

During the month of May, the Vacation Bible School will be conducted in all churches. CHILDLINE 1098 uses this opportunity to reach out and around 1520 (775M, 755F) children benefitted through this awareness.

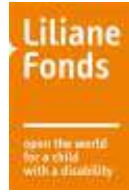

INDIVIDUAL AND COMMUNITY BASED REHABILITATION FOR THE DISABLED

“There is ability behind every disability”

Children with disabilities are one of the most marginalized and excluded groups in society. Facing daily discrimination in the form of

negative attitudes, lack of adequate policies and legislation, they are effectively barred from realizing their rights to health care, education, and even survival. Estimates suggest that there are atleast 93 million children with disabilities in the world, but numbers could be much higher. They are often likely to be among the poorest members of the population. They are less likely to attend school, access medical services, or have their voices heard in society. Their disabilities also place them at a higher risk of physical abuse, and often exclude them from receiving proper nutrition or humanitarian assistance in emergencies.

Children with special needs are children with a variety of different disabilities, health and mental health conditions that require special intervention, services, or support. Parenting a child with special needs can be particularly challenging. Fortunately, children with special needs and their families may be eligible for services to address their unique



needs, many of which are free. With the support of STITCHING LILIAN FONDS- Netherlands, 56 disabled children of various categories physically handicapped, hearing impaired, visual impaired, mentally retarded, cerebral palsy in the slums N.P.Vasal, Valluvar nagar, Andakondan, Srirangam and Singarathpouu were given home based training focusing on

- ❖ Daily living skills
- ❖ Orientation and mobility
- ❖ Language and speech
- ❖ Education in special schools, regular schools
- ❖ Tuition classes for below average students.

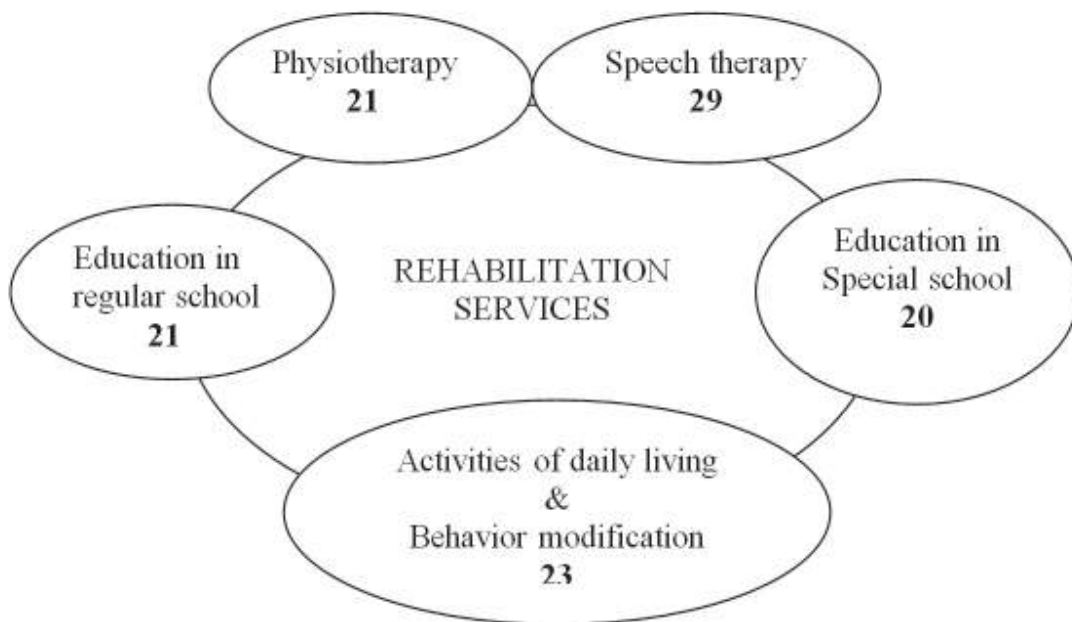

CHILD ADOPTION

(Ministry of Women and Child Development, Govt. of India)

Adoption is the social, emotional and legal process in which children who will not be raised by their own parents become full and permanent legal members of another family. Adoption is a way of providing new families for children who cannot be brought up by their biological parents. It is a legal procedure in which all parental responsibility is transferred to the adopters. Once an adoption has been granted, it cannot be reversed. An adopted child loses all legal ties with his / her biological parents and becomes a full member of the adoptive family, usually taking the family’s name.

Objectives

1. To provide excellent care, medical help and affection for abandoned and relinquished children in the society
2. To find suitable families for adoption and place orphan children in good homes
3. To provide information, guidance, counselling for families, and co-ordinate the process of adoption

Medical support

Every child at SOC SEAD is given the best possible medical care till he/she is given away for adoption. All essential immunizations and vaccines are given to every child. Medical records for every illness and ailments are maintained. SOC SEAD children get valuable medical help from well-known child specialists and paediatricians.

Co-Ordination with Allied System

SOC SEAD has established links and harmonious relations with the local police stations, Child Welfare Committee, educational institutions, Lawyers, hospitals, and NGOs (Claretian Mercy Home, Madurai) working in remote areas. SOC SEAD gets timely cooperation and collaboration from the allied agencies.

Parents from All Classes:

Generally, adoption was regarded as the privilege of the rich families. SOC SEAD never makes any sort of discrimination in its thoughts and actions. We have the parents from all religions, regions, castes and creeds. SOC SEAD believes that the contentment of parenthood should be available for all families irrespective of economical status. SOC SEAD has placed many children in a loving environment with good family values and ethos.

Relationships with Adoptive Parents :

Most parents face apprehensions and dilemmas before the adoption. They have several queries, both legal and psychological. SOC SEAD provides free counselling to the parents even if they are not adopting from SOC SEAD. It maintains special bonds of love and affection with every family that adopts our children. We maintain the relationships with our adoptive parents, as they are part of our big family.

a) Distribution of Notebooks and Study Materials

“Education is an empowering agent, which is very effective and practical tool, to shape the minds of the children”.

As important as it is to get children enrolled into schools, we also understand the need to provide them with the necessary tools to pursue education, and try to eliminate as many obstacles that might hinder their pursuit. SOC SEAD always gives importance to the children’s education. Every year study materials like notebooks, pen, pencil, bottle, scale, eraser, water bottle and tiffin box were distributed to the deserving children.

The programme started with the prayer song followed by the welcome address. Dr. (Sr.) Maria Kamalam, Director, SOC SEAD presided over the function. Then notebooks, study materials were distributed to the children. The children also sang some songs. The parents and the children were very happy and they shared that their burden is lessened and they need not worry about their children’s education.

b) Meeting the Parents:

The meeting was conducted to motivate and urge the parents to support their children to continue their education. The programmes also help to understand their behavior and also guide them properly. Since most of the mothers of the sponsored children are domestic workers, awareness about “Rights of Domestic Workers” was conducted. Parents are also advised once in three months on the importance of educating their children, on personal hygiene, to keep their home and surrounding clean.

c) Christmas Programme

CRECHES

Rajiv Gandhi National Creche Scheme for the Children of Working Mothers
(Aided by Central Social Welfare Board, Government of India, New Delhi)

Creches – Boon to children “the future in safe hands”

SOC SEAD targeted the parents to motivate and encourage their children to stay in crèches. It is worthy to note that we run 6 creches to augment the overall growth and development of 150 children in the age group of 0-6 years.

Crèches Have Achieved The Following Objectives Fulfilled

- Enhanced the learning ability of children
- Inculcated the school going habit in the minds of children
- Intellectual, Social, Moral, Physical and Emotional Development of Children.
- Paved the way for the unhindered earnings of the working parents by providing the most care to their children.
- Prevented school drop outs and the prevalence of increasing numbers of child labour among street children.



Pre School Training for Crèche Teachers:

In-service training was conducted for crèche teachers and helpers on 21.11.2013. Teachers are motivated to perform better. Topics ranging from child psychology, nutritional needs of children, health and hygiene, parent-child relationship, play way methods are being taught during training sessions. Physical, intellectual, social, emotional and moral development of children were elaborately handled.

During the sessions the teachers were trained to prepare different types of teaching aids like charts, puppets, flip cards etc. With this type of training the teachers are armed with the required teaching skills to instill the right kind of attitude for learning among children.



Interaction With Parents:

Meeting with parents were held every month in each centre. Normally, in those meetings, the parents are being given insight on the physical and psychological health of children, educational and nutritional need of children and also on the importance of habits of thrift and savings.

Health Care Programme:

Medical checkups were held for crèche children every month. Apart from this exercise, awareness programmes were also carried out for mothers on the importance of health, hygiene, environment, sanitation, etc.



Assessment of Skills:

Periodic assessments to evaluate the learning abilities of crèche children and to ascertain the consistency in their quality input were conducted by the teachers. This continuous exercise helps in creating greater responsibility among the crèche teachers.

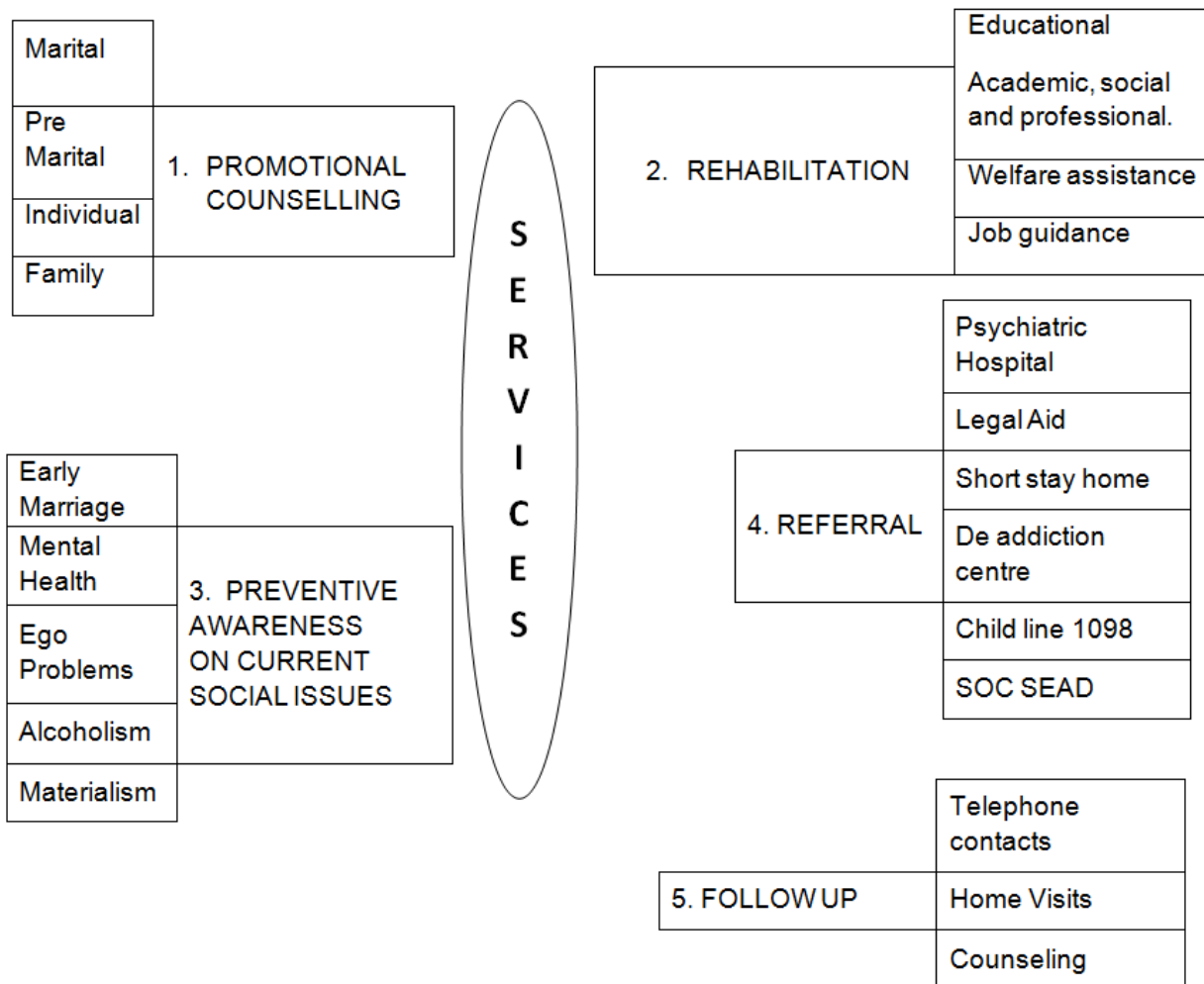

Prevention Services Rendered from April 2013 to March 2014 - Awareness Programmes

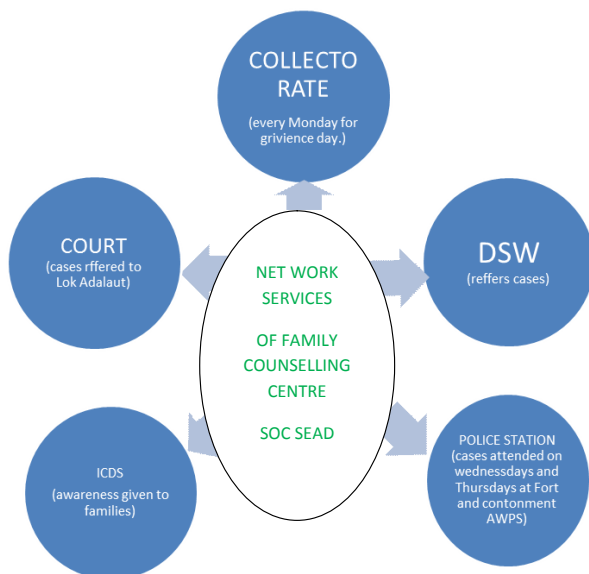

Introduction

Alcoholism is a broad term for problems with alcohol, and is generally used to mean compulsive and uncontrolled consumption of alcoholic beverages, usually to

the detriment of the drinker's health, personal relationships, and social standing. It is medically considered a disease, specifically an addictive illness. In psychiatry several other terms have been used, specifically "alcohol abuse", "alcohol dependence," and "alcohol use disorder" which have slightly different definitions.

Alcohol consumption has been steadily increasing in developing countries like India and decreasing in developed countries since the 1980s. The pattern of drinking to intoxication is more prevalent in developing countries indicating higher levels of risk due to drinking. 62.5 million alcohol users were estimated in India. Per capita consumption of alcohol increased by 106.7% over the 15-year period from 1970 to 1996.



Changing social norms, urbanization, increased availability, high intensity mass marketing and relaxation of overseas trade rules along with poor level of awareness related to alcohol has contributed to increased alcohol use.

SOC-SEAD, Integrated Rehabilitation Centre for Addicts makes professional intervention in the lives of addicts for better change. The centre has completed 13th year of service during which 3243 alcoholics and drug addicts were treated. During the last financial year of 2013-2014, totally 259 alcohol / drug addicts were treated.

Salient Features of the Area and Centre:

The SOC-SEAD, Integrated Rehabilitation centre for Addicts is located in the heart of Tiruchirappalli city, which has an easy accessibility by various transport services (24 hours) like bus, train and auto rickshaws. Supportive service systems like hospitals, psychiatric clinics, clinical laboratories, etc. are available within 1 km. radius.



The centre has a congenial and calm atmosphere with all facilities like spacious wards, clean environment, hygienic sanitation facilities and recreation like T.V, News Paper, playing materials. It also has a separate room for counselling, spacious therapy room, dining room, etc.

Introduction

A Nation cannot develop without the development of women. In other words, the development of a Nation is closely

linked with the development of women. It is a pitiable thing to note that women in the slums of Trichy city are the most exploited, unorganized and vulnerable lot due to various reasons. The two major factors which lead to this state of affairs are Poverty and Illiteracy. SOC SEAD took it upon itself to alter this anomaly and empower women. Periodical trainings and meetings are held by SOC SEAD to develop their talents and abilities.

The Goal of Self Help Groups (SHG) is

To become effective agents of change. They serve as a platform to establish the banking with the poor which is reliable, accountable and a profitable business.

SHG also enables livelihood opportunities for village women through micro-credit with the existing banks in the area.

Objective:

- To enable the poor and marginalized to have access to micro-credit with bank linkages via enterprising Self Help Groups.
- To promote the concept of SHGs by sensitizing bankers, the Government and NGO and generally raising awareness.

Activities at the Field Level:

- Monthly meetings of SHGs
- Formation of new Self Help Groups
- Motivation for saving and credit
- Nurturing Self Help Groups
- Providing guidance, support and instruction for better book keeping and bank linkages
- Distribution of all types of loans under the guidance and leadership of SOC SEAD.
- Mobilizing and networking with community groups, to strengthen and enhance participation and also inter-linkages.
- Motivating SHG members to participate in Community Based Livelihood

- Visits of various stakeholders to groups to share about the knowledge and potential of Self Help Groups and thereby to encourage future participation with the SHGs and to raise awareness
- Assisting stakeholders in order to build the dynamic and democratic process of SHGs
- Upgrading SHGs from a micro-credit accessibility to a social responsibility by encouraging active participation

Process in SHG Programme:

- More awareness building in the community about the importance and role of Self Help Groups.
- Formation of Self Help Groups and imparting of training to group members and leaders.
- Fixing the savings amount with members' participation.
- Formation of rules and regulations by facilitating the participation of all the members.
- Fixing an amount for the rate of interest as per the SHG members.
- Regular monitoring and evaluation of the groups. After six months to one year the SHG will be prepared for bank linkage.
- Making the SHGs self-reliant in book-keeping and banking work.
- Participation of group members in different workshops and melas organized by NGOs and banks.
- Assisting the groups to ensure 100% repayment of loans, within the group and to the banks.
- Mobilizing the capacity of group members to take responsibility for the various issues affecting their lives.

We regularly monitor and evaluate the SHG's in participatory process with the SHG members on following major parameters:

1. Record Keeping Capacity.
2. Group's Internal Democracy.
3. Group Saving and Loan Return
4. Member's Loan taking Capacity.
5. Income Generation activities and Group
6. Demand for training & their participations



VOCATIONAL TRAINING CENTRE

“With the changing economy, no one has lifetime employment. But vocational training provide lifetime employability”

opportunities for skill development are available. Most of the existing Skill Development programmes are long term in nature. Poor and less educated girls and women cannot afford long term training programmes due to high entry qualifications criteria and high training cost.

The primary purpose of vocational training is to prepare individuals especially the young girls and women in the age group of 19-30 years for the world of work and make them employable for a broad group of occupation. With this purpose, the centre is functioning at Mambalasalai.

40 young women benefited by this course and received their certificates. The successful candidates, who have been trained in Export and garment companies, started their own tailoring business.

In order to emphasize on Skill Development of the deprived girls and women, especially those with poor educational qualification and background; very few

for women. To provide a home feeling for the above people SOC SEAD has been running “AMAITHI NILAYAM”, a Hostel as a residential unit which fosters community living, provides security, especially for women and girl students, who cannot live alone. 80 inmates are staying in the hostel.

It is quite customary for people to move to the nearby city in search of work and when they make the move, especially women, find it to be daunting task to find a place to stay due to lack of security
